Waverly Terrace on National Register of Historic Places

Waverly Terrace, Columbus' first planned subdivision, has been named to the National Register of Historic Places. Being named to the National Register, the federal government's official list of his-

toric buildings and other cultural resources worthy of preservation, protects the neighborhood from intrusion by commercial businesses, says Historic Waverly Terrace Foundation President Presley
